

Genesis 1—11

Right from the start, the *Bible* is clear that God is the Creator of all things. He initiates the heavens and earth, light and darkness, plants and animals, man and woman. He invites humans into a perfect relationship with Him. Unfortunately, that relationship is spoiled when Adam and Eve are enticed by the serpent into disobeying God. 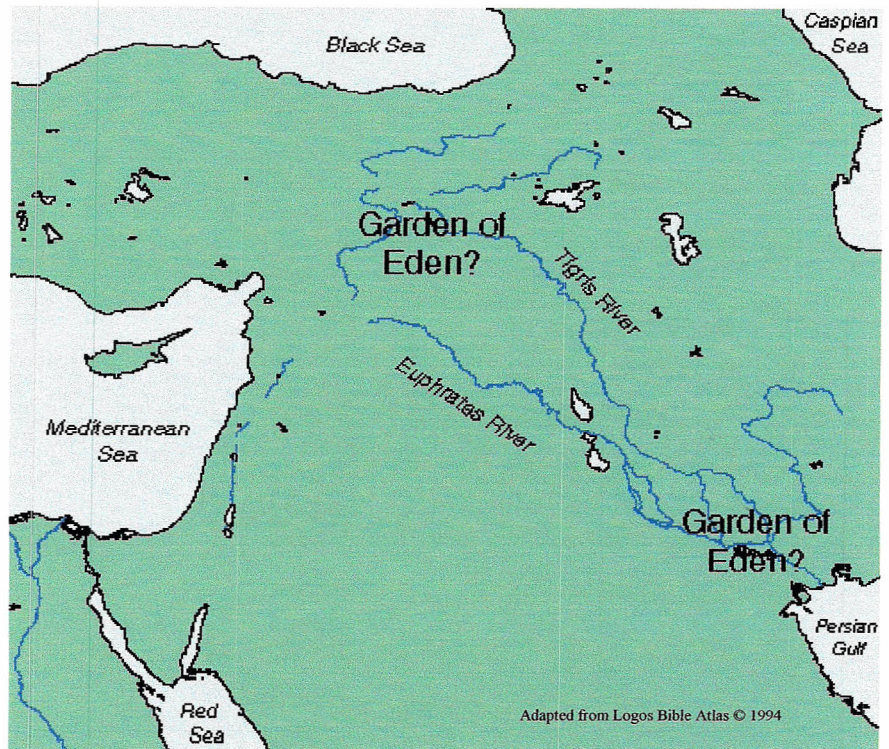
